Make a large pot of your favorite soup at home and bring it to the church in six one-quart containers, either glass jars, zip-top bags or reusable containers. Soups not in glass jars should be frozen. (If you bring fewer than six quarts, that is OK. You will only go home with as many soups as you bring.)

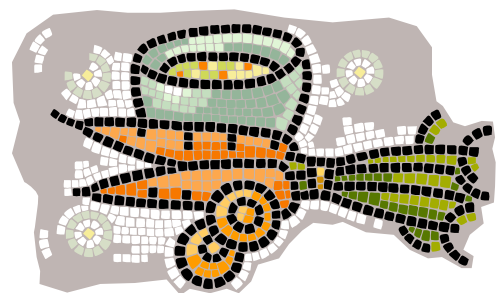

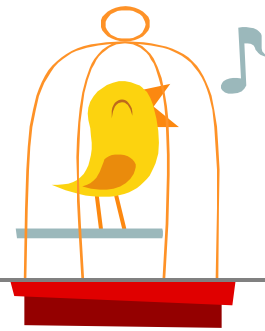

**On the 12<sup>th</sup> day of Christmas**, for 13 hours, 14 youth joined in a lock-in. We spent the time in discussion, prayer, soup making, cookie baking, dancing to VBS songs of old, Nerf Terf Play, fort building, talking about the vitality of the youth program in the Epworth “The Journey Continues”, the youth funds, summer camp, tithing, communicating with parents, and so much more! 4 adults chaperoned the event, leading and guiding, observing and correcting...Working together, the youth had a great time, most all remaining awake the whole time.

When the adults are engaged in the youth program, the youth, too, can engage. The more we, as adults, stand together, advocating for the youth and providing a safe place for them to be who they are, while guiding and correcting where necessary, the more likely the youth want to be involved. One of the comments of the youth was, “We are always shoved in the kitchen for the church doing someone else’s dirtywork.” They feel that they are only valuable to Epworth for dish-washing, because that is what groups in the church want them to do. We highlighted that youth also help as Greeters, Serving Communion, and Reading Scripture during worship, as well as helping with the Drive Thru during fish fry. Let us continue showing the youth how valuable they are to *THEIR* church by leading and guiding, and washing dishes **ALONGSIDE** them.

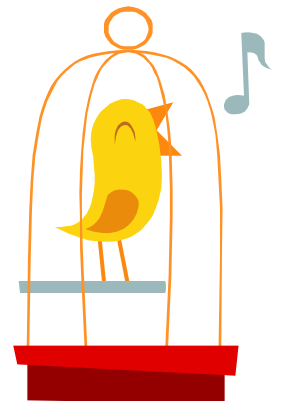

## Spirituality

### What is it?

Spirituality can only be studied and experienced in context with our other real world experiences.

Through spirituality we seek that which will give meaning and understanding to our everyday experiences, our persisting fears and lingering questions.

Spirituality is:

An attitude toward life.

A perspective toward life.

A way of being in the world.



Spirituality is a *lens through which we see God acting in our world*. Rooted in common life's experiences, it *preserves the mystery of life and our relationship with God and helps to demystify it*. As we grow spiritually, we receive more meaning to our common experiences.

The appropriate goal of a spiritual life is *not* to experience more emotional highs or moments of ecstasy, but to be more aware of the sacredness of *all* of life's moments & relationships. We should not necessarily seek experiences, but rather pay attention to the ones we have in context to our relationship with God.

Spirituality is an inward walk, whereby we reacquaint ourselves with our history, peel away our layers of resistance, and prepare ourselves for God's presence.

## OUTREACH 50 CHALLENGE UPDATE

Several of Epworth's Sunday School Classes and Small Groups accepted OAT's Outreach 50 Challenge began reaching out to our neighbors. The December Echo had a report on what the Office Staff, Seekers and Gleaners had done. Here is an update:

The Boys Group decided to purchase a Thanksgiving dinner for four. They worked through Chiyona to find a worthy family. They also donated food to a local food bank and made a cash donation to The Little Red Door Cancer Agency.

The Women's Bible Study used their \$50 to buy bus tickets. Excitement over the project resulted in many members of the group adding their money to the project. The result was that they were able to purchase 60 trip tickets. Other members knitted hats and scarves. They divided up into two groups and went to bus stops. The women reported that they met some very appreciative individuals who accepted the gift. Others were reluctant at first because they weren't in need but after an explanation accepted the gift with a promise to pass it on to someone who could use it.

And this update from the Seekers: in addition to donating cash to needy families at Allisonville Elementary School the seekers also did another project. Class members contributed \$110 which is being given out randomly in \$10 increments with no comments other than "Happy Thanksgiving" to eleven soldiers in uniform having lunch at one of the restaurants in the Fort Ben area. The following note was paper-clipped to each \$10 bill:

Tippy's friends added more money to their \$50 and partnered with Rick Purvis, owner of The Coffee Brake at 62<sup>nd</sup> and Allisonville, to create vouchers for a free small coffee or it's equivalent. Rick also discount the small coffee to stretch the money a little further. They left some vouchers with Rick to distribute as he saw fit and class members distributed the rest to patrons entering the Coffee Brake or exiting Big Lots or other businesses in that strip mall. The idea was to randomly distribute the vouchers, supporting a neighborhood business and presumably reaching people who either live in the area or pass through on a regular basis. They report feedback was good and that they received questions about Epworth and the Live Nativity. Tippy's Friends also passed the hat and bought movie tickets for Rick and his family for helping out.

# ZIMBABWE FOOD THANK YOU

Thank you to all who continue to support the Zimbabwe Food Ministry. As a result of your loose coin contributions in November, 75 chickens were purchased and delivered to the Feed the Hungry Group of St. Mark's Methodist Church in Harare, Zimbabwe. Additional food was purchased through your on-going support of this ministry, resulting in a total purchase of over \$1700 for items reflected below. The food was delivered for Christmas. Another large purchase was made in November. The food is purchased in Zimbabwe and distributed by the ladies of St. Mark's to an orphanage which also feeds street people in the area and a to an area where old people live. Again, thank you for truly making a difference in the lives of some of our Zimbabwean brothers and sisters.

Complements of the new season to you. Its this time of the year again where we find love and care from you people at Epworth Methodist Church. We thank you so much for all you did for the less privileged in Zimbabwe. After distributing the food we received I went to the rural areas this is why I could not write you in time. The food was received and distributed before Christmas and this brought smiles on the faces of the old and the orphans we thank you.

The following items were received and distributed

- 75 chickens
- 100 loaves bread
- 20 tins jam
- 150kgs mealie meal
- 20kgs tea leaves
- 200 kgs rice
- 100kgs flour
- 150kgs sugar
- 10kgs salt
- 20kgs kapenta
- 25bars soap

I also promised to give you the amounts of food received in November the list was

- 200kg s rice
- 75kg flour
- 150kg sugar
- 100kgs beans
- 50litres cooking oil
- 25 peanut butter
- 150kg mealie meal
- 20kg tea leaves
- 20kg kapenta
- 100 loaves bread
- 10kg salt
- 20kg powdered milk
- 25 bars soap

# GREEN TEAM TASK

## Insulate your Water Heater

**Task:** Install an insulating blanket on your water heater. Set the thermostat to 120°.

Although water heaters are insulated, they can lose heat and waste energy if located in an unheated space, or designed with minimal insulation. If your water heater feels warm to the touch, you will save money and have more hot water by adding more insulation.

**Advanced:** To save more energy on water heating, consider solar water heaters, tankless, and geothermal pre-heating options. Note that some people limit their hot water use to certain hours of the day, and turn it off completely for the rest of the day and night.

Water heater blanket kits are available for gas or electric water heaters which are non-allergenic (no fiberglass), and provide up to 97% radiant heat loss.

You can also make your own water heater blanket which can be thicker and cost even less to install. Here's how:

Use "faced" fiberglass insulation (one side is papered over) to keep the fiberglass particles out of the air. Cut strips of insulation 3" longer than the circumference of the heater. Wrap them horizontally around the heater and seal with vinyl duct tape.

Using a razor knife, cut away around thermostat controls, drain faucets and vents.

If your heater is gas powered, do not cover the burner access. Leave three inches of exposed area around the flue collar.

If you have an electric heater, cut a circle of insulation and fit it over the top, cutting slits for the pipes to go through.

Seal any exposed fiberglass with duct tape.

Covering up labels on water heaters may, in some cases, void warranties. Be sure to read labels to see if this condition applies.

### What else you can do:

Cut back on hot water use by limiting showers to 5 minutes, washing laundry in cold or warm water, and washing dishes efficiently.

### Lower settings on water heater:

Most water heaters are factory pre-set at 140 degrees. This may be more than you need, especially in a one or two person household. If your hot water supply is adequate, try lowering the thermostat to 120 degrees. Experiment within the 120-140 range to find the lowest setting which supplies you with enough hot water. Every degree you reduce will save energy costs and reduce pollution.
